Francis Jackson died last week at the age of 104. He started his musical career as a chorister at York under Edward Bairstow, then became organist in 1946. He served the Minister for 35 years, retiring in 1982. He played for the wedding of the Duke of Kent and Katherine Worsley in 1961, ending the service with Widor's *Toccata* - the Pathé newsreel of this helped popularise the piece. He wrote over 150 works for organ and for choir - *Jackson in G* is a popular communion setting (one which we plan to sing as a tribute to him later in the year). We also use his hymn tune *East Acklam* for "For the fruits of his creation". Geoff Howell tells me that in 1970 he gave the first recital on the new organ at St Alkmund's church in Derby, and in 1990 wrote an anthem "For all thy saints, O Lord" for the choir of Derby Cathedral. A lovely obituary at <https://www.msn.com/en-gb/entertainment/music/francis-jackson-organist-composer-and-doyen-of-cathedral-music-who-spent-nine-decades-associated-with-york-minster-obituary/ar-AASHuac> tells me that one of his pupils was James Barry, who wrote much of the music for the James Bond films!
