Prayers of Intercession

As we gather, we give thanks for another week where normality seems to be returning. We give thanks for places that have been able to reopen – for people in the pub garden, for steam trains in the Ecclesbourne Valley, for a choir back in our services. We give thanks for Adam and Billie who were married yesterday, for Jeff and Pauline whose wedding takes place at Abbeydale on Wednesday – we pray for our residential homes, for staff, residents and families. It does feel as if Easter hope is more of a reality than perhaps it felt a fortnight ago, and we are grateful. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Yet we know life is not easy. There are people, including many of our friends, who are still frightened about coming out, who do not feel safe in this new world. There are communities that have changed, shopping habits that will never be the same, business that will never reopen, churches still unable to worship as we would like. While we give thanks for new ways of worship, we face challenges as we balance them with the old. We pray for ourselves, our City, our Diocese, for Allestree Churches Together and the work you have called us to do. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Lord, in many parts of the world, Covid is still devastating lives and communities. We think of the pictures we have seen from Brazil, we ask your forgiveness for the minimal vaccination programme in so many parts of the world. We know there are new variants, a continuing battle, and the lives of our brothers and sisters across the world are under threat. It is so easy to pray in gratitude, and to ignore the pain and suffering of others. Lord, may our Easter faith be a faith that inspires us to work for your Kingdom – in our lives, and in the lives of all humanity. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We know that Covid is not the only battle being fought. We think of the scenes from Mozambique, Myanmar, and closer to home in Northern Ireland. Lord, we never thought we would be back in a situation where we have to pray for Northern Ireland every week. We pray for young people seduced by the excitement of violence and the encouragement of others, we pray for so many people who want to keep the peace they worked so hard to achieve, and we pray for politicians who seem to have learned so little about how peace needs to be constantly worked for. We pray for calm, wise heads, for a way forward that brings communities together. There is evil that needs to be fought, we ask for your strength.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We pray for our country, for our leaders at National and local level. We pray for those in our health services, for those who are shattered by all they have been through. We pray for those who need a level of care we are struggling to provide, for all the political questions of resources and supply, of pay and reward. We ask Lord for generosity and fairness. We pray for our friends in hospital, for all undergoing medical treatment. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We remember Prince Philip and all those who have died, we give thanks for the promise of resurrection. We pray for their families and friends – for Her Majesty and her family, on that day after a funeral when you know you have to move on, but it's so hard. Help us, Lord, to have faith as we journey in Easter light. And we pray, as Jesus taught us: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name: thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.
