

## St. Edmund's Dec. 2023/January 2024 Services

Mask wearing is still optional in St Edmund's, as from the 1st of February 2023. However, we do ask you to stay away from church if you feel unwell. We recognise that some people still choose to wear a mask: if this applies to you, you are very welcome to continue to do so. The PCC also recognised that it is possible that the Covid/flu situation could deteriorate very quickly. Should this be the case, the Standing Committee will meet and decide whether mask-wearing, or other control measures, should be re-introduced.

For **communion**, the arrangements for going to and from the rail were relaxed from 1st February this year. However, please recognise people's need for space and try to avoid crowding others. As always, it's very much appreciated if you could follow any directions given by that day's welcomers!

You will be offered the bread and the wine. If you do not wish to drink from the chalice, then simply smile and shake your head and it will pass you by. Do not use your wafer to 'intinct' – to dip it in the wine. You may feel safer, but there is more opportunity for germs to get from your fingers into the wine. It also can introduce gluten into the wine – a problem for those of our congregation who need to stay gluten-free.

Coffee now takes place weekly (many thanks!) after the Sunday morning service, in the Church Hall, the other side of the Red Cow. The Sunday morning Zoom service has now stopped.

## Churchwarden's View: A Regular Update by Paul Smith

#### St Edmund's at Our Best

If you weren't able to join us for Remembrance on 12 November then you missed a solemn and moving day full of contrasts. In the morning we had a wonderfully well-supported service complete with the traditional laying of wreaths and placing of crosses at the war memorial. Many thanks to Revd John Rice for carefully planning and leading our service, and thanks too to all who contributed by preparing beautifully printed orders of service, making sure the clock was "on time", sweeping up leaves, putting up and taking down the flag, playing the Last Post, and leading worship inside while the rest of us were at the war memorial. The church was beautifully decorated with poppies and red roses, as well as memories of the fallen. The choir sang William Harris's serene anthem "Holy is the True Light", and we were honoured to welcome Mrs Ruchita Shaikh, HM Deputy Lord Lieutenant, as well as all three Allestree councillors together with representatives of our local Guides and Scouts.



And yes, as 11am approached, we stood in the chilly rain as Pat Godfrey of the Royal British Legion solemnly read out the names of those from Allestree who served and died in the two Great Wars of the 20th century. I can't have been the only one who reflected that it's not too bad standing outside in the cold and wet for 20 minutes, when set against the misery of all those service personnel who had to cope with the daily horrors of flooded trenches in Flanders, and the total carnage of the first day of the Battle of the Somme in 1916 - still the worst 24 hours ever in the British Army's history, with nearly 20,000 wiped out in a single day.

And then, in the evening, the mood became more intimate as the choir sang evensong with the small congregation sat in the choir stalls next to them, and Clive Lemmon, who has been such a strong supporter of St Edmund's through the Vacancy, offered a moving reflection on the current situation in the Middle East. Never have those lines "O Pray for the Peace of Jerusalem" seemed more apt.

At the same time as all this sombre reflection, a lot of planning is going on behind the scenes for Christmas and beyond. We now know Revd Rachael and Revd Sarah will be licensed on 14 January and, after a formal "swearing in" at each of the four churches, we will see much more of them as they develop their ministry with us.

And before that, preparations are well under way for the usual Christmas Services, including Carols in the Churchyard (13 December) as well as Christingle and Nine Lessons and Carols (on the morning and the evening of Sunday 17th December respectively) and crib services plus Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve.

This is a time when we welcome many people who don't normally attend our, or indeed any, church. Last year we had just under 300 at our special services, compared with an average Sunday morning congregation of 45. Please join me in offering a special greeting to these people, many of whom will be families with children: I'd love them to feel so welcome at St Edmund's that they want to come back some time before Christmas 2024!

## Support Christian Aid this Christmas

Throughout this year, we have become painfully aware of conflict in Europe and the Middle East and the destruction, deaths, injuries, and disruption it causes to ordinary people's lives. These are the situations to which some of Christian Aid's resources are directed. In addition to direct support to those in need, including refugees from war and famine, Christian Aid continues to campaign on the adverse effects of climate change which affects less advantaged people far more than those who are richer.

Christian Aid relies on personal donations, including Christian Aid Week, to supply around two thirds of its income, with the other third coming from institutional funding including that from UN and EU-supported development schemes and from UK government foreign aid<sup>1</sup>.

Christian Aid's receipts from each of the latter sources have declined significantly,

both because of changes in UK overseas aid policy and due to withdrawal from EU schemes following Brexit<sup>2</sup>. Consequently, the number of overseas aid projects and the amount of practical support overseas that Chistian Aid can provide has diminished. In line with this, staffing levels have been reduced and the administration streamlined<sup>3</sup>.

The reduced UK government contributions to Christian Aid reflect the reduction of the UK aid budget from 0.7% to 0.5% of gross national income (effective from 2021) <sup>4</sup>. Out of this budget, the amount spent annually on support for refugees in the UK (less than £0.5bn, approximately 3% of the aid budget, up to 2019) rose to just over £1bn, 9% of the aid budget, in 2021 following the

introduction of the Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme and then very sharply to nearly £3.7bn (about 29% of the aid budget) in 2022 when schemes were introduced to help refugees from Ukraine<sup>5</sup>.

This Christmas, we will support Christian Aid's ongoing work with your donations made at each of our Christmas Eve Services. So, if you come to either of the Crib Services or Midnight Mass, please bring a gift for Christian Aid and use either the



envelopes and gift aid slips in church or our contactless terminal or you can make a personal donation online. You will be making a real difference and bring hope to people around the world.

The next Christian Aid Week is 12-18 May 2024.



## Our Duty: to Remember the Fallen

When I worked in France for a year teaching English as part of my degree course, I never realised that I had three family war graves within one hour's drive of the city of Lille where I was based. Just across the Belgian border, my nan's first husband, Sidney Dormer (Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry), is buried at the Huts Cemetery near Ypres, while in the Paris direction, my great uncle Sgt Edwin Smith MM (Sherwood Foresters) lies in a green meadow beside the now tranquil river Somme. Slightly to the north from there, near the former mining villages around Lens, Kate's great uncle 2nd Lt George Morrison (10th Scottish Rifles) lies in Lapugnoy cemetery surrounded by bluebell woods.

These cemeteries are moving: their design gives them a very British feel and the thing that strikes the visitor is not vast fields of headstones but just how many of these small graveyards there are. No matter where they are located, the grounds are immaculately tended by the Commonwealth War Graves commission; their website at https://www.cwgc.org/ makes it very easy to find any particular grave.



Given that so many years have passed, it's now unlikely that we will get veterans even from WWII attending our services of remembrance. But with so many of our churches having war memorials, and indeed war graves, within their buildings and churchyards, it's now even more important than ever to actively remember the war dead. We must cherish these memorials: the peers of the fallen are no longer here to keep the memory alive, so we who benefit from their sacrifice must make it our duty to do so. As the commemorative scrolls sent by King George V to bereaved First World War families ask "Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten".





## **Book Review**

## "THE CHRISTMAS MYSTERY" by Jostein Gaarder

Pub Softback by Weidenfeld & Nicolson, 1997 ISBN 978-0-753-80866-5



Youngsters these days can be so wise in many ways, in others so very (that over-used word) vulnerable, so bound by the everyday and the literal. How can we, who have more life-experience, help them to assimilate something less transient, more enchanting and timeless? This story, written by the Norwegian author of "Sophie's World", is intended for children possibly aged about 7-13 and some a bit older. Its big additional challenge is that their tame adults may have to read it with them as well.

The structure is well-chosen: it's in chapters, each based around an Advent-calendar, starting with "The First of December" and ending on Christmas Eve, all of them quite short. Each one has part of a story-within-a-story. The present-day narrative is about a boy, Joachim, and his father ("Papa"), who go out to buy such a picture-calendar late on 30 November. As events unfold, we also pick up from them insights into the history of Jesus's birth and life and the early Church – starting in the recent past and moving backwards towards Bethlehem, the stable, the shepherds and what is much more familiar.

These sound, perhaps, most unlikely starting-points for a children's story, but what really brings it to life is that everything is approached via characters and people. We meet Papa and Mama in the present, people from the recent Middle-Eastern past, various kings, saints and prophets, and so on. One vivid example is the tale of St Nicolas, the early Bishop of Myra in Turkey (p 181), who gives his name to Santa Claus (and other name-variants) and became famous for his generosity in the 4th century AD. Another character asks if the name "Myra" is at all related to "Myrrh", and so we (and Joachim) learn a bit about the Three Kings too. This is told matter-of-factly and simply – with elements of here-and-now detail, such as "... all this was a long time ago, before such things as banks existed".

One of the strongest messages to come out of the story is that when trying to understand a Mystery, it's useful to refer to books. At different points Papa, an angel or the narrator will consult the Bible, a world atlas, an encyclopaedia or similar, to be sure of facts and connections. Papa, for example, looks up "Nicolas of Myra" and says "Quite correct ... he was the very first Santa Claus".

Another clear message percolating through the book is one of love and practical

generosity – personified by Bishop Nicolas, of course, but also by many others in Christian history. After a simple telling of the parable of the Good Samaritan, an angel adds, "... there's no sense in believing what's right unless it leads to helping people in distress."

There are two small drawbacks to this otherwise lovely piece of work, and one is lack of an Index, which would be so helpful in locating specific dates, people and episodes for discussion or just a re-read. The other is some of the Angel-names; "Ephiriel", "Seraphiel" and "Impuriel" are easily credible in-context, but may not be fully based on evidence.

To return to the beginning, no carer, uncle, grandparent or other house-trained adult can transmit beliefs or teaching directly into the mind of a young person wholesale. But one thing we can do is read together and explore a tale, its wayside markers, its characters, twists and turns and – since this is a Mystery – the final resolution. At first publication in 1996, this little book was described by a breathtaken reviewer for the Daily Telegraph as "compelling reading". The charm, the sheer quality of the writing, and the compression of over 2,000 years of history and thought into graspable past/present parallels are outstanding; "The Christmas Mystery" is a great tool for for shared enjoyment and learning. It made one of the most delightful Advent gifts I have ever had, a couple of years ago. A must for every parent – if the kids don't steal it first ...

... and a word of praise for the Translator, Elizabeth Rokkan, too, who has made it so accessible in English. I will gladly lend.


## Recipe: Cranberry Relish


## More Derbyshire Walks (41)

#### HORSLEY AND BRACKLEY GATE

In medieval times the two locations above operated as 'entry gates' at opposite ends of the hunting grounds of Horsley Park. They can be linked by following an interesting route around the site of the old park, which crosses Horsley Lodge Golf Course (including the Roman route of Ryknield Street) and passes through the site of long-demolished Horsley Castle. The distance is  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles which includes two lengthy gradients.

lengthy gradients.

Horsley Park's medieval grounds lay south of today's Horsley village, with Brackley Gate as the park's main entrance point on the southern boundary. This was one of many post-Norman hunting estates which entertained the occasional royal visitor, no doubt facilitated by having a castle on the site. Today, the main clue to its earlier existence is in some of the local names such as Parkgate Farm and Horsley Park Farm, apart from a specialist interpretation of certain boundary features. The old boundary can be roughly defined (clockwise) as follows: the Coxbench to Horsley road, the E side of the Golf Course,

Mark's Hill, Horsley Carr bridleway, and Bottle Brook. The main valley is drained by Park Brook which flows east to west between Smalley and Coxbench, then into Bottle Brook and south to the Derwent. On the ascent of Mark's Hill there are good views, including Park Brook valley behind and, on a clear day, Crich Stand and Carsington

Moor's wind turbines to the far NW. Nearby lies the route of the old Roman road, **Ryknield Street**, which crossed the SE corner of the Park (ref. OS Explorer map 259); its inferred line is 'crossed' twice on the walk at Horsley Lodge and Mark's Hill. This was part of the great route which ran for 112 miles from the Fosse Way at Bourton-on-the-Water to Templeborough near Rotherham, via Birmingham, Derby (Chester Green) and Chesterfield.

Horsley Castle was originally known as Horeston Castle, constructed in the reign of King Stephen (1135-54) with locally quarried stone and repaired several times since. It was one of many 'tower keep' castles or strongly fortified residences built between the Conquest and the 15thc. Badly affected by early quarrying, it was finally demolished in 1760 to provide stone for the rebuilding of Kedleston Hall and to permit still more extensive quarrying. The result is that little remains to be seen, alas, with the site now thickly wooded and overgrown (hence no photograph) but its position on a wooded ridge overlooking the valley (now dominated by the A38) can be appreciated, especially on looking back from the walk's final ascent to Horsley.

Horsley, from which our walk starts, has a shared parish with Kilburn and Coxbench. The Church of St. Clement is of 13thc origin with restoration in 1860 and grade 1-listed; its renowned peal of bells includes ancient ones made at Nottingham and Chesterfield. In 1864 the area's chief landowners, the Sitwell family, funded the creation of 3 fountains (each named after a female family member) seen on the Green

and along Church Street - which marked the first time that Horsley had received a piped water supply. The Sitwells also built Horsley Lodge, which was restored and landscaped in 1990 when the present Golf Course was opened. The neighbouring hamlet of Coxbench used to have a railway station, opened in 1856, on the Little Eaton to Ripley branch of the Midland Railway. Passenger services closed in 1930 but coal traffic continued for many years; the station was later converted into a private residence. Coxbench Hall, located at the foot of Portway (Holbrook) is a late 18thc listed building, now a residential home. Also at Coxbench and passed on the walk is St. Anthony's Well, which was moved in 1979 from a cottage garden in which it had existed since 1611; it is said to have been used by passing monks for the healing qualities of its waters (now near the busy A38 – perhaps not ideal!).

## More Derbyshire Walks (41) continued

#### HORSLEY AND BRACKLEY GATE continued

The Route starts from near Horsley Church (limited parking in cul-de-sac) and proceeds along Church Lane to the Smalley Mill Road junction. Go past the junction and take a f/p R opposite the Coach and Horses Inn. After the second field when the f/p divides take the RH branch into Horsley Golf Course; then generally proceed in a SE direction, with a few spaced-out yellow & green posts to mark the pedestrian route, as follows: take the L branch of the entry path, pass ½R through a line of trees, ½R on a path & bridge across Gypsy Brook (385442), L on path through trees, ½R rising steeply up a bank and L along far side of Practice Fairway, R down to Hall carpark far corner, L near Barn Cottage, along outer fenced side of Driving Range, 1/2R at end through line of trees and across fairway (Hole 8) to far corner, footbridge R over Park Brook (393436). Cross and head diagonally through paddock gates to Smalley Mill Road and cross to a rising f/p marked Cloves Hill. When it divides at the second field (391431) take the RH (forward) branch via Mark's Hill to Brackley Gate Farm. Turn R on Sandy Lane, branch L at Horsley Park Farm (382431) and follow the track curving L to a f/p heading W through a woodland ridge. An optional branch L & R passes (carefully) some deep quarries and the Castle site, then rejoins the main f/p down the edge of the wood towards the A38. It passes the fenced Tophills Dog Kennels (rather noisy!) and turns R on Castle Farm drive to Coxbench Road (and St. Anthony's Well). Cross and ascend Horsley Lane then take a f/p sharp L; just past Rock Cottage turn R up steps, then ascend across fields past The Old Bothy towards Horsley Grange (good view of Holbrook L). Take the f/p's L fork (376442) which heads N to Horsley Church and exits at the cul-de-sac.

## Recipe: Mulled Wine

The Roman cook Apicius had a recipe for mulling white wine, using various spices and a good deal of honey (among other ingredients that are harder to find nowadays). My Latin Director of Studies served an adapted version of this to a group of us as students. It was, shall we say, interesting – and the only instance I have ever come across of using white wine for this purpose!

Here, instead, is a well-used family recipe for mulling red wine. Any red will do, but I find Tempranillo especially well suited because of its softly rounded flavour. Allow about a bottle per 3 people, and don't (as some do) throw in extra brandy at the last minute; the aim is that all the alcohol is steamed off, so that the recipe is OK for drivers.

You will need your biggest pan and a spoon for stirring. Purists would want to serve the wine into glasses (if you do, be sure to warm them a little or they'll tend to break). More practical is to use mugs. To make up for the aesthetic difference, aim for each serving to contain either a cinnamon stick or half a slice of orange – both look pretty and inviting. For the actual serving process, it can be easier to use a mug than a ladle, but either way have some kitchen towel ready to wipe off drips.

#### TO SERVE 6

#### **Ingredients:**

2 x 75 cl bottles red wine A little nutmeg

1 pint tap water Blade of mace (optional)

2 heaped tablespoons soft light brown sugar 6-8 cloves

2-4 cinnamon sticks Half a lemon, preferably unwaxed

1 large orange, well cleaned

#### Method:

Put the water and wine in your pan. Slice the orange and lemon thinly, making sure that any excess juice goes into the pan too, and halve the slices. Add the sugar, spices and fruit and then start heating on a low temperature. Leave the lid off, and keep stirring gently so that the sugar dissolves.

Don't leave the hob; above all don't allow the mixture to boil; just keep heating slowly and steaming away until you see that the surface is becoming white and bubbly, ie the mull is very near to boiling. This process should take about 10-12 minutes depending on your cooker.

Now your wine is ready to serve, so quickly remove from the heat and if possible get someone to help with ladling into mugs or glasses. Enjoy!

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## **Diocese of Derby**December 2023 message

During Advent, in the run up to Christmas, we pray: 'even so, come Lord Jesus'.

Our prayer longs for the fulfilment of God's promise that the risen Jesus will come again in glory and, at last, death shall have no more dominion, every tear shall be wiped away, sword will be turned into ploughshare, and, by God's merciful judgement, every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Our prayer also hopes, in the meantime, for the fulfilment of God's promise that the risen Jesus will be with us always to the end of time. 'Come, Lord Jesus' is a prayer not just for the end of all things but for today. It is a prayer that remembers that Jesus first came to ordinary people in the midst of their everyday life.

I've been having conversation, in the run up to Christmas, with people in Derby and Derbyshire whose everyday today echoes the ordinary lives of those in the first Christmas story.

I've heard stories of sheep farming, chatted with a hotel owner, learnt about midwifery, talked to a broadcaster, met with an educator and listened to a child. (You can hear these Christmas Conversations through Advent via the diocesan website derby.anglican.org or my BishopLibbyLane Facebook page).



God chose to become part of everyday people's ordinary lives when Jesus was born. Those we read about in the gospels weren't particularly special people, weren't especially good or religious, wouldn't have made history except that God chose to share their lives. God chooses that still. And so, we glimpse heaven in the ordinary, as I did through my conversations.

As I pray this Advent, in the run up to Christmas, 'even so, come Lord Jesus', I'm hoping to catch sight of God in the everyday lives of people around me, people like you – the ordinary people of Derby and Derbyshire. Not because we're particularly special or especially good but because this is how God chooses to be known. And until the end, when Jesus comes in glory, we find the Kingdom of God among us.

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
