

No St Matthew's Church

Thomas Evans (1723-1814)

Built the Cotton Spinning Mill complex from 1782 in Darley Abbey, bringing employment and accommodation opportunities to many





Left a fortune in 1814 to his son Walter Evans (I)

Timeline

1800 George III (40th year of his reign)

1801 Union of Great Britain and Ireland to form the UK

1803 John Dalton put forward the Atomic Theory

1805 Battle of Trafalgar – Admiral Nelson was killed

1807 Slave Trade Act abolished such in the British Empire

1814 George Stephenson designed his first steam locomotive

1815 Battle of Waterloo – Wellington defeated Napolean

St Matthew's Church was consecrated on Thursday 24 June 1819,


the 55th birthday of

the main benefactor of the church

'For one individual to devote so large a sum of money to the erection of a building for the purpose of public worship, is truly an unusual instance of pious liberality.'

['Derby Mercury' 1 July 1819]




DARLEY-CHAPEL BEST DERBY, S.E. 1838

1819 Queen Victoria and Prince Albert were born 1819 Victoria was christened on the Consecration Day

EVANS FAMILY PATRONAGE 1819 - 1929 ('The first century')



St Matthew's Church was in the parish of 'St Alkmund, Chapelry of Darley Abbey'

Rev Thomas Sanders (6 years)

Reports of his death said he was 'highly respected in Derby and the neighbourhood, being formerly curate of Darley Abbey'



119 baptisms (20 per year)63 burials (10 per year)No marriages until 1847

Timeline

1820 George III died aged 81. George IV became King

1821 Arthur Evans died aged 21 (son of Walter (1))

Baptistry memorial. First burial in the Evans Crypt

1822 Mrs Sarah Gracie (old servant) buried in the Crypt

1823 Charles Babbage designed a rudimentary calculator

Rev John H Dickenson (6 years)

An 1835 Commercial Directory for Derbyshire listed:

'Dickenson Rev. John Horatio, Darley.'

This is 4 years after John H Dickenson left as curate, but is likely to refer to the same individual.

Timeline

1826 Village School built at the expense of Walter Evans (I)

1829 Catholics could sit in Parliament (Emancipation)

1830 George IV died. William IV became King

1830 William Evans M.P. – submitted anti-slavery petitions

1831 Charles Darwin began his 5 year voyage in 'Beagle'

Rev John Wakefield (6 years)

'The living is vested in Walter Evans, esq. and the present incumbent is the **Rev. John Wakefield.**'

('The History and Gazetteer of the County of Derby' 1833)

His death announcement in 1888, at the age of 92, said that for the last 37 years he had been rector of Hughley, Shropshire, previously being a **curate at Darley Abbey**

Timeline

1835 Slavery was abolished in the colonies

1836 Elizabeth Evans (Strutt) died aged 78Buried in the Crypt. Memorial in Church1837 William IV died. Victoria became Queen until 1901

Rev William George Mayne (1 year)

The background of this curate remains to be found





13 baptisms (13 per year) 21 burials (21 per year) No marriages until 1847

Timeline

- 1837 Isaac Pitman proposed his system of shorthand
- 1837 Charles Wheatstone & William Cooke patented their electric telegraph system
- 1837 Civil recording of births, marriages and deaths began in England & Wales
- 1837 Brunel's 'SS Great Western', the first steamship, was launched. It was wooden and sailed the Atlantic
- 1837 Euston was the first intercity railway station in London
- 1837 Queen Victoria made Buckingham Palace the official Royal Residence

Rev William Warde Fowler (5 years)

Died aged just 32. Buried at St Matthew's. Memorial in the Church







72 baptisms (14 per year) 62 burials (12 per year) No marriages until 1847

Timeline

1839 Walter Evans (I), founder of St Matthew's, died aged 75 Memorial in the Church – the Church was his memorial Interred in the crypt alongside his wife Elizabeth

1839 William Fox Talbot pioneered photography

1840 Queen Victoria married Prince Albert, both aged 20

1843

Rev John Edmund Carr (less than a year)

He married Ellen Evans, daughter of William Evans Esq. of Darley, in April 1822

His short time officiating at St Matthew's may have been a case of 'helping out' his Evans family relatives after the early death of the Rev William Warde Fowler.

He officiated at the burial of the Rev Fowler.
No marriages until 1847


Timeline

1843 Brunel's 'Great Britain' was the first iron steamer.
When launched she was the largest ship in the world
1843 Nelson's column was built in Trafalgar Square
to honour Admiral Lord Nelson

Rev Dr John Griffith (10 years)

'Rumbustious John'

He was a noted mathematician, a distinguished scientist, an eminent educationalist, a passionate gardener a social reformer, and a vigorous Christian preacher.



400 people flocked to Griffith's farewell presentation.

Timeline

1845 Potato famine in Ireland started – continuing to 1852. It caused mass emigration from Ireland to America

1847 St Matthew's was licensed for weddings

1851 The Great Exhibition of 'industry of all nations'.
Organised by Henry Cole and Prince Albert

1852 King's Cross station opened – largest in Europe

1852 First British public toilet for women opened in London

1852 End of the Great Irish Famine – one million emigrated

Rev Edward Cox (1 year)

The background of this curate remains to be found







15 baptisms23 burials3 marriages

Timeline

- 1853 Queen Victoria used chloroform at the birth of Leopold. Chloroform became the favoured British anaesthetic
- 1854 Britain joined in the Crimean War against Russia
- 1854 Florence Nightingale left England to care for soldiers injured in the Crimean War
- 1854 The disastrous 'Charge of the Light Brigade' occurred at the Battle of Balaklava in the Crimean War
- 1854 Lord Tennyson wrote his well-known poem: 'The Charge of the Light Brigade'
- 1854 Holman Hunt painted: 'The Light of the World' There is a framed copy in this church.

Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me.

Rev Francis I Jones (14 years)

He baptised 5 of his 10 children at St Matthew's. His son, 'Kemble' died in 1868 aged 7

He emigrated to New Zealand in 1880. He died there in 1891, aged 67

Timeline

1855 David Livingstone discovered the Victoria Falls in Africa

1856 William Evans Esq of Allestree Hall died aged 68
As an MP he opposed the 'corn laws' and slavery
Memorial in Church (& Allestree). Interred in the Crypt.

1856 Queen Victoria instituted the 'Victoria Cross'

1856 Crimean War ended

1856 First Oxford and Cambridge boat race on the Thames

1859 Mary Evans (widow of William) died aged 73.

Memorial in Church. Interred in the Crypt

1859 Charles Darwin published his 'The Origin of the Species'

1861 Prince Albert died aged 42.

Queen Victoria wore black for the rest of her life

1861 American Civil War started. Difficulty getting cotton

1863 Football Association was founded and laws agreed

1864 Elizabeth Garrett Anderson was the first woman doctor

Rev Thomas Pritchard White (1 year)

'White, Thomas Pritchard' is recorded as being a student at Corpus Christi College in 1842 and being ordained a priest in Hereford in 1847.

He is not recorded as being a curate at Darley Abbey, but rather that from 1861 to 1870 he was vicar of Dorrington, Salop.

Perhaps he was just helping out at this time?







4 Baptisms10 Burials1 Marriage

A Rev T P White died in Worcestershire in 1893, aged 73.

Timeline

1868 Disraeli (Conservative) was defeated in General Election.
Gladstone (Liberal) became Prime Minister
1869 A Cambridge College for Women (Girton) was founded
1869 Sainsbury's first store was opened. It was in London

Rev John Dawson (1869-1874 – 5 years as Curate) (1874-1876 – 2 years as the first Vicar)

The Vicar of Ewell, Surrey, said Mr. Dawson was:

'An able, intelligent and attractive preacher of sound Evangelical Principles, his whole heart is in ministerial work in and out of the pulpit, whether in visiting the sick and poor, in superintending the Schools and especially in organising and conducting Bible Classes for the labouring poor'

Timeline

1869 Suez Canal was opened

1870 Arthur Evans died aged 15. Son of Walter and Susan

1872 First English FA Cup Final -

Wanderers v Royal Engineers. Wanderers won

1873 The Scottish Football Association was formed

1873 Frances Evans died. Daughter of William and Elizabeth

1874 Samuel Evans died aged 89. Son of William Evans

1875 Caroline Evans died aged 85. Wife of the late Samuel

1876 Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone

Rev Charles Brittan (21 years)

The longest serving Vicar so far.

He lived from 1881 in the newly built vicarage, now 'The Old Vicarage School'.

His daughter May fell & damaged her spine aged 8. She died in 1888, aged 15.

Charles showed great concern for sick children

1877 First cricket Test Match. Australia won

1884 Darley Abbey parish moved to new Southwell Diocese

1886 Sanctuary was extended, new Choir Vestry, new pews, new organ, coloured window glass, new font

1888 'Football league' was formed – Derby County a member

1891 Susan Evans (wife of Walter (II)) died aged 58.



Rev William Martin (17 years)





Letter from 203 Parishioners:

'We wish to place on record your unremitting interest in affairs concerning the welfare of the Village, your unfailing sympathy & kindness have endeared you to all, especially to the sick and poor and those in trouble, to whom your visits have been a source of comfort and help.'

1896 Rev Martin married Walter Evans (II) to Ada Roscoe

1899 The Boer (South African) War began

1901 Queen Victoria died aged 81. Edward VII became King.

1902 The Boer (South African) War ended

1903 Walter Evans (II) died, aged 77

1904 Rev Alfred Ainger (Ada Evans' uncle) died aged 66

1910 Edward VII died. George V became King.

1911 National Insurance Act – beginning of Welfare State

1913 Suffragette died after being hit by the King's race horse

1914 Start of World War I – Battle of Mons (Belgium)

Archdeacon Edward Spencer Noakes



(16 years)

Vicar through most of WW I

Started Parish Magazine in 1915

Centenary services in 1919

His wife, Georgina, painted a picture of the vicarage, now the 'Old Vicarage School'.







58 baptisms (4 per year) 95 burials (6 per year) 50 marriages (3 per year)

Timeline

1915 Liner 'Lusitania' sunk by torpedo. We have a memorial 1918 The Great War (WW I) finished

1918 Women over 30 who were householders gained the vote

1918 Worldwide influenza epidemic infected 500 million

1920 Electric lights installed in the church

1921 War Memorial was dedicated. Captain Noakes, son of Archdeacon Noakes, unveiled the cross

1921 Northern Ireland was formed from 6 Ulster counties

1928 Alexander Fleming discovered penicillin

1928 World's first transatlantic TV transmissions by Baird

- 1929 Ada Evans (last of the Evans family) died aged 69.
 Her home, Darley Hall with surrounding parkland, became the property of Derby Corporation
- 1930 Frank Whittle patented his 'jet engine' design
- 1931 The Duke of Kent opened Darley Park (formerly the parkland of Darley Hall)

Canon John Francis Cooper (6 years)

He had been the vicar of St Peter's Church, Belper, for 17 years before coming to the smaller parish of Darley Abbey for health reasons.



In 1931 he gave permission for the stone coffin from Nutwood to be moved to St Matthews.

He retired to Bournemouth for health reasons

1930 Amy Johnson was the first woman to fly solo to Australia

1935 Malcolm Campbell was the first person to drive at over 300 mph in breaking the world land speed record.

1936 George V died aged 70. Edward VIII became King

Rev Major John E Price (9 years)



Vicar right through WW II

His only son was killed in 1938 when the seaplane he was piloting crashed.

A choir of 12 men and 17 boys (1 evacuee) was maintained throughout the war.

Timeline

1936 Edward VIII abdicated after only 326 days. One of the shortest reigns in British history. Duke of York became King George VI

1936 Burial of Georgina Alethea Noakes, aged 71, by the Bishop of Derby at St Matthew's

1937 Coronation of George VI was first outside TV broadcast

1939 Germany invaded Poland. Start of World War II

1944 Frank Gates, organist and choirmaster died, aged 65

1944 Burial of Archdeacon Noakes, aged 83 by the Bishop of Derby at St Matthew's

1945 May 8th – the European conflict of WW II ended

Rev Eric Moreton (6 years)



The worship was 'High Church'.
The Reverend Moreton liked to
be called 'Father Moreton'

The choir had 8 men and 10 boys, and the choirmaster and organist was Mr Dennis.



A major housing estate was built in 1970 next to the Church

The Church had the foresight to negotiate land next to the Church for a car park.

1975 – Walter Evans C of E School was built close to the Church, combining the C of E Schools of Darley and St Edmund's



1989 – The Village Pageant was a major, successful, outreach and fund raising event. £60,000 was needed for the restoration of the Church (roof and window masonry).



2000 – Fellowship Room extended, modernised, and a new choir vestry

2000 - Interior re-ordered to integrate the choir and organ with the congregation

2000 Plain glass N.E. window replaced with 'Millennium design'

Changed the name of the Church Magazine to the more normal 'Parish Magazine'.

Got excellent ceiling lighting installed.


